Since the creation of USAFSS as a major air command in 1948, members of USAFSS/ESC/AFIC/AIA/AF ISR Agency/25th AF (hereinafter referred to as the command) have been at war 24/7/365 as anonymous sentinels, engaged in combat

Elmendorf FLR-9 "Another One Bites the Dust"



JOINT BASE ELMENDORF-RICHARDSON, Alaska -- For half a century, the "Elephant Cage" has cast a shadow over the Alaska landscape, silently collecting and finding the direction of communications signals, guarding against adversary threats and intentions. The intelligence collected informed our nation's and allied decision makers, from presidents to warfighters. In later years it fulfilled a crucial role aiding in navigation and direction-finding for civilian and military search and rescue missions. After five decades of service, this symbol of intelligence operations is being retired.

The AN/FLR-9 (commonly pronounced Flare-9) is a large circular antenna array affectionately referred to as the "Elephant Cage" because of its massive 40-acre footprint and 120-foot tower height. Its design was based on the German Wüllenweber antenna. During World War II, German naval technicians in a secret research and development program designed and built the original antenna. Following the war, the original structure was destroyed according to terms negotiated under the Potsdam Conference, and a secondary system was disassembled and brought back to the U.S. for an in-depth engineering analysis.

Built in 1966 at the height of the Cold War at what is now Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson, the antenna is the last of eight systems which originally comprised a worldwide network. Each system could intercept and directionally locate high-frequency radio transmissions up to 4,000 nautical miles away. Over time, these structures succumbed to many different fates.

Three were dismantled as a result of base closures: Ramasun Station, Thailand in 1975; San Vito Air Station, Italy in 1993; and Royal Air Force Chicksands, England in 1997. Another at Karamursel Air Station, Turkey, was demolished following a conflict over foreign aid to Greece in 1977. The array at Clark Air Base in the Philippines was irrevocably damaged by the eruption of Mount Pinatubo in 1991 and subsequently converted to a covered amphitheater.

Most recently, Misawa Air Base, Japan, deactivated their AN/FLR-9 in 2012 and demolished it in 2015.

Initially maintained and operated by the United States Air Force Security Service, and locally by the 981st Electronic Security Squadron, today, the operation and maintenance of the AN/FLR-9 is executed by the men and women of the 373d Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Group and a cadre of trained civilians.

In May of 2016, during a Decommissioning Ceremony at the 373d, the last of these mammoth structures will be deactivated and powered down for the first time in 50 years.

"The development and diverse geographical deployment of these systems was a noteworthy intelligence achievement for the period," said Air Force Col. Suzanne Streeter, 373d Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Group commander.

"Advances in technology, along with the high cost of maintenance and availability of replacement parts, have shifted the AN/FLR-9 antennas across the Air Force from an operational capability to historic monuments."

Though upgraded over the years, it is a testimony to the engineering and workmanship of the antenna that many parts are still original and have never been repaired or replaced.

The antenna array is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. There is already interest in preserving the site, similar to the Nike Missile Site on Site Summit near JBER's eastern edge

"I've been fortunate to have three tours flying fighters at Elmendorf, and I've seen a lot of changes since my first sortie here in 1994, including the runway orientation," said Air Force Col. Charles Corcoran, 3rd Wing commander.

"One thing that never changed was the 'elephant cage.' Whether sighting it from long distance on a beautiful clear day in Alaska, or catching a glimpse of it after breaking out of the clouds on an instrument approach, a pilot always knew he was home as soon as the 'elephant cage' was visible."

Efforts are currently underway to explore the conservation of the antenna to honor its 50 years of service.

The 43rd Anniversary of the loss of Baron 52

On this forty-third anniversary of the loss of some of our own, let us pause to pay respect to their memories and to remember their surviving family members. These were our reconnaissance brothers and they are our heroes. They made the ultimate sacrifice. Paid the ultimate price.

(How Can It Be So Long Ago, Yet Still So Fresh in Our Memories?)

The loss of the eight man crew of BARON 52, an EC-47Q reconnaissance aircraft (Tail #43-8 636) flown by a 4-man flight crew from the 361st Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron (TEWS) based at Nakhom Phnom RTAB, in east central Thailand.

Accompanying was a 4-man USAF Security Service (USAFSS) reconnaissance crew who were members of Detachment 3, 6994<sup>th</sup> Security Squadron located at Ubon RTAB, in southeast Thailand (very recently arriving from Detachment 2, 6994th SS, operating from Da Nang AB, Republic of Vietnam).

This mission was launched from Ubon RTAB February 4, 1973 at 23:30 (local Thailand time).

The aircraft and crew were shot down in the early morning of February 5, 1973 between 01:40 and 02:00 approximately 45 miles southeast of Saravane in the Steel Tiger area of Laos while on an unarmed nighttime reconnaissance mission. At last report, after reporting in stating that they were taking fire and were altering course, the crew gave an "all clear" signal a few minutes later.

The incident occurred nine (9) days after the formal signing of the Peace Accord between the U.S. and both North and South Vietnam, "ending hostilities in Southeast Asia". Laos was NOT a signatory to that agreement.

#### Mr. Gordon W. Sommers



Gordon William Sommers entered the kingdom of Heaven on February 20, 2016 in San Antonio, TX. Born on Jan 22, 1922 in St. Louis, MO, he graduated from Kirkwood High School there in 1939. He graduated from Princeton, summa cum laude, and was elected Phi Beta Kappa in 1943. Gordon began a lifelong career of service to his country in 1943 when he entered the U.S. Army, attained the rank of Captain, and served until 1947. Gordon then began working civilian service with the Army Security Agency (ASA), transferred to the Air

Force Security Service (USAFSS), headquartered at Brooks AFB, and was reassigned in 1979 to the Electronic Security Command (ESC). Gordon served as advisor to the commander of headquarters at ESC in the review, evaluation, formulation of policies, concepts, and objectives governing the mission of the globally dispersed command. Among the numerous commendations and awards for his service was the National Intelligence Distinguished Service Medal, authorized by William Webster, CIA director. Gordon was a founding member of the Air Force Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Agency's Freedom Through Vigilance Association and was inducted into its Hall of Honor in 1983. Gordon and his late wife, Dorothy, were married in 1957 where for 37 years and had two sons. As members of St. David's church, Gordon served on the church vestry twice and was actively involved in Agape Ministries. Dorothy lost her battle with cancer in 1982. Gordon remarried in 1984 to Vicki Sommers. They were married for 28 years before she passed in 2012. Gordon is survived by two sons: Gordon E. Sommers and his wife Patty along with their four children; and Bill Sommers and his wife Dana with their two children; Gordon is survived by twelve great grandchildren. A loving husband, father, grandfather, and great grandfather Gordon will be remembered for sharing his faith and love of God, his service to his country, and his devotion to his family.
